By August of the 2021-2022 school year, La Joya ISD will start the implementation of the 21st CCLC, Cycle 11, Year 1 Program by:1)Opening ten (10)ACE centers at ten high poverty area, low performing Elementary Campuses, with 3 feeder schools included in the program, that will provide academic enrichment opportunities that target students' identified academic areas of needs to meet state standards and increase participating students academic performance by 10%, attendance by 5%, Parental Involvement by 10% and decrease discipline referrals by 20%. 2) Provide after school academic enrichment to 1,690 students at the 10 ACE locations (and 3 feeder schools) and 3) Recruit & retain 100% ACE program student participation and completion rate through implementation of a strong parental involvement component within the program to ensure students meet challenging academic standards.

Identify & recruit At Risk, ELL, Minority and Sp. Ed students to participate in the ACE program 5. Advertise ACE Program to students, parents, community, teachers and staff and recruit certified teachers and tutors to impart after school instruction and start parent component and activities by FES (After School, Before School and/or Virtual)

### Second-Quarter Benchmark

1) Ensure all ACE selected Elementary Campuses have been properly staffed with an ACE Coordinator.

2) Start Operations of all ACE after school centers.

3) Director collaborates/meets with Campus Coordinators & Campus Administration to review data to evaluate progress: Attendance Report, Grade Reports, Parent Meeting Logs and Discipline Report.

4)Continue identifying & recruit At Risk, ELL, Minority, 504, RTI and Sp. Ed students to participate in the program.

5) Ensure adequate pool of highly qualified certified teachers is in place to provide after school ACE services.

6) Collaboration between ACE Coordinator/Director & Campus Leadership to ensure academic needs of students being serviced are addressed (Coordinator planning with after school teachers and regular instruction teachers).

7) FES conducts at least 3 parent information sessions per 6 weeks for parents of all ACE centers(or virtual).

### Third-Quarter Benchmark

1) Director collaborates/meets with Campus Coordinators to review data to evaluate progress: Attendance Report, Grade Reports, Parent Meeting Logs and Discipline Report.

2) Ensure ACE operations after school are occurring as scheduled (sign in - time sheets - student attendance).3) STEM / STEAM Activity Camps to increase ACE student participation and retention

4) Tutoring Sessions (tailored based on students' needs) will be offered at all centers (in person and/or virtual) 5) Provide PBIS motivation activities each 6 weeks grading period to participating students whose attendance improve by 2%. 6) FES continues providing parent information sessions and self-sufficiency classes/activities (ELL classes, Parenting, Computer Literacy, Financial Literacy ...etc).

6) Provide trainings to all participating campuses teachers & staff on PBIS initiatives once per semester.

In order to ensure the project is meeting the goals and milestones as required by program guidelines and grant requirements, the ACE Director and Campus Leadership will monitor attainment of program goals, strategies and objectives.

Project Evaluation data will be constantly reviewed to ensure program is performing as required. Data reports will be produced and evaluated every 3 weeks (twice every 6 weeks grading period). A Program Review Time line will be created by Texas ACE Director and reviewed for input of Campus Principals from participating campuses for final approval.

In the event that SMART Goals do not show progress, ACE Director, ACE Coordinator and Campus Leadership will convene to analyze evaluation data and utilize it to create a plan of action that will target the SMART Goal objectives: 1) Opening ten (10) ACE centers at ten high poverty area, low performing Elementary Campuses, with 3 feeder schools included in the program, that will provide academic enrichment opportunities that target students' identified academic areas of needs to meet state standards and increase participating students academic performance by 10%, attendance by 5%, Parental Involvement by 10% and decrease discipline by 20%.

Provide after school academic enrichment to 1,690 students at the 10 ACE locations (and 3 feeder schools) and
 Recruit & retain 100% ACE program student participation and completion rate through implementation of a strong parental involvement component within the program to ensure students meet challenging academic standards.
 Additionally, participating ACE campuses will be evaluated by an External Evaluator who will assess if the campuses are showing appropriate progress towards the established Objective Measures and the required program

guidelines Performance Measures.

ACE Director will monitor all ACE Centers to ensure implementation fidelity in activities and budget allocations to ensure projected per student center level costs are maintained within budget (\$453.24 approx) per student. Monthly budget reports will be analyzed by Project Director & disussed with Campus Coordinators & modified as needed.

A.) LJISD administration and campus leadership conducted a robust needs assessment process that: 1) Identified academic needs/gaps of each campus (Student performance & teaching staff certifications & yrs of experience) 2) Identified academic gaps created due to current COVID-19 pandemic situation and, 3) Required/requested campus leadership feedback and letters of commitment to participation on the 21st CCLC Cycle 11, and 4) Analyzed resources available to the community in order to assess the specific needs of each campus selected for participation. Student performance in state & district assessments, attendance, graduation completion rate, discipline reports, currently offered instructional programs and currently available infrastructure as well as current staff certifications and years of experience were analyzed. Additionally, data provided by the Curriculum & Evaluation department for students tested during the 1st 6 weeks of the 2020-2021 was provided and analyzed against student performance results during the 1st 6 weeks of the 2019-2020 school year. The analysis revealed a widening gap on student performance from 2019 1st 6 weeks to 2020 1st 6 weeks. One contributing factor to the growing gap could be attributed to current pandemic situation created by COVID-19 and having students partaking on virtual learning instruction with limited home connectivity and technology resources. Feedback provided was utilized to formulate a program plan that includes high quality after school program enrichment activities as well as staffing the 21st CCLC program with Coordinators that must at a minimum hold 3 years prior successful teaching as evident on TTESS evaluation and teaching certification in a core content area. Participating Campuses letters of support / commitment attached. (Activities to implement include Arts, STEM & STEAM Camps, Sports/PE Camps... etc. See attachment. B) La Joya ISD plans to serve a total of 1,690 students (30% eligible students at each participating campus and 15% eligible students from the 3 selected feeder schools). In compliance with the 21st CCLC Cycle 11, Year 1 Program guidelines, the campuses that were surveyed and analyzed to participate in the program meet the criteria of being identified as located in a high poverty area and/or are in the category of low performing campuses. La Joya ISD student population to be served includes Minority students, At Risk 77.62%, Economically Disadvantaged 91.39%, English Language Learners 56.64%, Students w/ Disabilities 10.19%, Migrants 4.43% (PEIMS Fall 2020 Report attached). Each of the 10 campuses (and 3 feeder schools) will serve students that meet one or more of these demographic criteria to participate in the 21st CCLC Cycle 11 Texas ACE after school program. Proposed campuses to create a 21st CCLC Cycle 11, Texas ACE center at their campus are: 1) Flores Elem. 2) Chapa Elem. 3) Diaz-Villarreal Elem. 4) Perez Elem. 5) Gonzalez Elem. 6) Paredes Elem. 7) Clinton Elem. 8) Corina Pena Elem. 9) Evangelina Garza Elem. and 10) Mendiola Elem. with 3 additional feeder schools that will feed students into 3 of these centers 11) Leo J Leo Elem. (Feeds to Flores Elem.), 12) Kika De La Garza Elem. (Feeds to Diaz Villarreal Elem) and 13) Cavazos Elem. (Feeds into Perez Elem.) See attached NEEDS ASSESSMENT for analysis conducted of data for these campuses. C) Each Texas ACE Center will have an ACE Coordinator who in collaboration with campus leadership will analyze student enrollment data the second day of school to determine which students qualify for the program and will most benefit from participating. Once identified a strong Recruitment Plan will be implemented that will include contacting, informing parents and community of the 21st CCLC Texas ACE Programs, the enrichment activities available for students after school and possibly before school and/or virtually, as well as the strong parental component of the program which will offer parents the opportunity to be engaged in their child/ren education as well as gain skills such as financial literacy, self sufficiency, attend Social Emotional programs that teach how to lead with current COVID19 and pandemic situation, and provide center hours of operation that meet the needs of working families sending students to the Texas ACE Centers. ACE PD & Coordinators will continuously assess enrollment and implement recruitment strategies. ACE Coordinators must have 5 yrs successful classroom experience (TTESS /PDAS eval.) & core area certification.

### State Performance:

According to the 2018-2019 TAPR results, La Joya ISD students' STAAR performance all grade / all subjects is lagging behind the State's performance between 4-5% At Approaches Grade Level, Meets Grade Level and Masters Grade Level. While the State is performing at 78% for At Approaches, La Joya ISD students performed at 74%. The State Meets Grade Level performance is at 50% while La Joya ISD students performed at 45% and the State's Masters Grade Level is at 24% while students at La Joya ISD performed at 17%.

Through the implementation of the Texas ACE Program at 10 Elementary campuses, La Joya ISD will target the following:

Growth in State Assessments and Improve GPA: Increase participating regular attendees academic performance by 10% at the 10 participating Texas ACE campuses. La Joya ISD will implement a Texas ACE program that helps students meet their educational needs by addressing their local academic needs as well as the students' needs in state and local assessments. The Texas ACE program will meet the students core academic needs by providing activities that are carefully coordinated with the regular instructional day and target the areas in which they need intervention. Student needs will be analyzed and objectives will be covered during ACE Program activities through targeted planning between the ACE coordinator,

selected teachers to impart after school instruction and campus leadership. By implementing a program that carefully plans after school activities to target the students' areas of needs, students will be able to increase their state assessment performance as well as increase their grades performance. Activities will target students' educational needs in order to increase academic performance. (see attached list of proposed activities). Increased School Attendance: La Joya ISD Attendance Rate as per the 2018-2019 TAPR Report shows a 94.1% rate in comparison to the 95.4% State's Attendance Rate. La Joya ISD will implement a Texas ACE Program that will increase school attendance at the 10 participating elementary schools through the delivery of meaningful after school activities that will include nutrition and health, violence prevention programs, arts, music, physical fitness and wellness programs, STEM, STEAM, technology education activities, financial literacy, math, science and high demand industry pathways presentations for elementary students before they transition into Middle School where they can start taking some CTE Industry Pathway courses. It is the goal of the ACE Program to successfully increase attendance of participating regular attendees by 5% upon program completion.

Improve School Day Behavior: La Joya ISD 2018-2019 TAPR Report shows a 1.3% of students with Disciplinary placements. La Joya ISD will implement a Texas ACE Program that targets students with at risk behaviors and recruit them into the Texas ACE Program. Providing students with high quality after school, engaging activities that target and promote desired behavior and promote academic performance will be one of the highest priorities of the program. Activities that promote positive behavior, build trust between students and families such as mentoring, will be implemented to increase student focus on education. Additionally, through successful Texas ACE Program implementation, discipline referrals of participating students will decrease by 20%.

Increase Student Engagement in Learning through Parental Engagement activities: Having parents involved in their child/ren education is key to ensure student success. La Joya ISD has 56.7% of English Learner students who come from households where one or both parents are immigrants that do not speak English. In order to involve the parent in their child's education, La Joya ISD will implement a Texas ACE program that will provide parents with opportunities to attend workshops, trainings as well as English as a Second Language classes that will prepare them to better assist their child/ren and be more involved in their education and academic needs. Workshops will range from trainings that will familiarize the parent with academic requirements for the students as well as self-sufficiency workshops for the parents, ESL classes and/or GED classes. It is the goal of LJISD ACE Program to increase Parental Engagement by 10% for regular attending students.

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3. Describe the proposed program activities and how they are expected to improve student academic achievement and overall student success. LJISD's proposed ACE Program will improve student academic achievement by incorporating key research strategies into the program design to:

1) Align the Program Academically with the School Day and targets TEKS & STAAR students with most needs.

2) Maximize Student Participation and Attendance through engaging activities targeting high needs students.

3) Adapt Instruction to Individual and Small Group Needs in order to provide high quality student activities.

4) Provide Engaging Learning Experiences at all ACE Centers

5) Assess Program Performance and Use of Results to Improve the Quality of the Program. (US Department of Education's "What Works" publication. Published by the Institute of Education Sciences National Center for Education Evaluation and Regional Assistance.

1) LJISD Texas ACE Programs will align with the school day. Program activities will be specifically targeted to address student needs on TEKS standards, LJISD instructional goals and Campus Improvement Plans (CIP). Current district/campus resources will be maximized to address campus needs and ACE funding will supplement and not supplant existing programs. Summer programs will provide interventions for students based on their struggling areas of need to ensure individualized needs are addressed and campus academic ratings improve. LJISD will use technology resources to increase student participation and engagement and provide resources to students through CLEVER, myON, Reading Renaissance. These programs provide students with access to electronic books, audio books for students and families that will improve and increase student's and community literacy. LJISD recently started implementing the myON to provide students with reading materials due to online instruction because of COVID-19 and the need to provide online instruction. Academic enrichment activities will be provided that will incorporate STEAM, STEM, and project based hands-on teaching practices that will reinforce regular school day instruction. LJISD will provide tutoring, homework assistance, State Assessment Preparation (SAP) sessions for STAAR, TELPAS as well as activities that promote and encourage students to embrace a college going culture and connect students with orientation to current career pathways. 2) LJISD will maximize student participation & attendance: LJISD will offer after school activities that encourage, attract students & families to participate and are academically and culturally appropriate to all participants. LJISD will ensure families have active, meaningful participation in their student's education by providing parents with PD on how to access student grades, literacy courses, career choices, connections to Texas Workforce Development sessions, workshops & job fairs. Feedback will be constantly collected & reviewed by campus and district administration to ensure academic and enrichment activities reflect the students and parent's interests and provide student's voice and choice. Family Engagement: LJISD will incorporate engaging opportunities at all Texas ACE Centers for families of participating students. Parents will have access to technology training, self-sufficiency training, counseling, Texas Workforce Development, English Language classes, and GED classes, just to name a few. The Family Engagement Specialist will collaborate with LJISD partners and the LJISD's Parental Involvement Department to ensure participating families receive the services and support needed to ensure the educational excellence of their student(s). 3) Adapt Instruction to Individual & Small Group Needs: LJISD will carefully review data to ensure activities & support are appropriately adapted to provide students with academic & social & emotional skill development activities (see attached activity list) 4) Provide Engaging Learning Experiences: LJISD's Texas ACE Centers will incorporate hands-on enrichment activities, STEAM, STEM, Fine Arts, and exciting curriculum that is aligned to the school day to ensure student academic success. Enrichment activities will supplement and not supplant current campus efforts. Activities such as Health, Nutrition, Fine Arts, STEM, STEAM, Self-Sufficiency, Technology, Culinary Arts, Gardening will be offered at all participating Texas ACE Centers. 5) Assess Program Performance & Use Results to Improve Quality of Program: LJISD will constantly monitor the performance of all Texas ACE centers to ensure program quality. Ongoing professional development will be provided to all staff from participating Texas ACE centers. PD will target data driven decisions and alignment to address students' needs and ensure appropriate instruction to reach academic success. PD & Coordinators will implement goals attainment plan at all ACE Centers.

To ensure successful implementation of the 21st CCLC program, La Joya ISD will foster partnerships that address Academic, Enrichment, Leadership and Socio-Emotional components which are critical to student success. • Behavioral Health Solutions of South Texas: A non-profit organization that focuses in providing social services to participating students and their families. Due to the current pandemic situation, this partnership is critical for our students and parents to provide socio-emotional programs, counseling & support. Services to be provided include 1)Parenting Awareness & Drug Risk Education (PADRE) 2)Youth Prevention Drug & Alcohol Prevention Programs 3) Uniting Neighbors in Drug Abuse Defense (UNIDAD) 4) Empowering Communities. · Buckner Family Pathways: Partnership in Texas that provides encouragement and information to assist single parents with affordable housing, child care, parenting skills, counseling, family coaching, and money management. •Texas A&M Agrilife Extension Expanded Food & Nutrition Education Program: Program helps young families and youth with limited resources-those most at risk to suffer from hunger, food insecurity and the inability to obtain help. Lessons in basic nutrition, food preparation, food budget management and food safety in settings convenient for the participants as well as fun physical activities for adult participants that can be done at home/virtual. •Texas A&M Agrilife Extension Family & Community Health Programs: Budgeting, Child Health & Safety, Gardening • La Joya ISD Parental Involvement: The 21st CCLC Cycle 11 program will closely work with the Parental Involvement director to provide services to parents at each ACE center that include self sufficiency sessions, access to ESL classes, access to GED classes and other services (free clinics, free eye glasses...etc). • UTRGV & South Texas College (STC): La Joya ISD will partner with the UTRGV & STC - College of Education Preparation Programs and collaborate to recruit mentos from their current students that will assist 21st CCLC Cycle 11 students to build character, improve self-esteem and reinforce positive behavior and decision making skills. • Region One Education Service Center: Serves parents with professional development and services to improve student outcomes, providing leadership and innovation to transform learning communities toward excellence. • Law Enforcement: La Joya Crime Stoppers & Hidalgo County Sheriff's Department : Crime Stoppers & Sheriff's Dept. will provide students and parents with information sessions regarding safety, staying in school, drug use prevention, as well as involve students in a summer camp designed to prepare parents and students on community policing which includes safety, what to do during dangerous situations, self-defense strategies as well as lectures to discuss the merits of staying out of trouble and following school rules, and information session on safety programs. • Child Nutrition Department/Texas Department of Agriculture: La Joya ISD will partner with the La Joya ISD Child Nutrition Department / Texas Department of Agriculture to provide students with a nutritious meal each day during the program. This will ensure students have the energy needed to be mentally focused to learn and complete homework. Providing students with a nutritious meal during the after school program is an important factor and key to ensuring the success of the program. 91.39% of La Joya ISD students are economically disadvantaged over 50% of students age 5-17 live in poverty which surpasses the state poverty rate of 20% (see attached graphs). Best Practices: La Joya ISD will implement best practices that will complement & enhance academic performance, achievement, postsecondary and workforce preparation and positive youth development of students. ENHANCE ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE & ACHIEVEMENT: LJISD will implement best practices at each ACE center by ensuring Coordinators have at least 5+ yrs of successful core area teaching experience, as evidenced by T-TESS and/or PDAS evaluations. Texas Education Agency (https://tea.texas.gov/texas-educators/preparationand-continuing-education/approved-educator-standards) Texas State Board for Educators creates rigorous standards for all teachers. Ensuring each Coordinator is highly qualified with a core content area teaching certification and at least 5+ years successful teaching experience will ensure instructional capacity at each center is enhanced. ACE Coordinators will have the instructional capacity and leadership skills to provide guidance to teachers and mentors that will impart after-school instruction to students that aligns directly with the regular school day instruction. Having the ability to impart and model instruction for mentors/tutors as well as analyze student data and determine instructional areas of needs is key to enhancing student academic performance, achievement, postsecondary and workforce preparation (See Attached). POSTSECONDARY & WORKFORCE PREPARATION: LJISD will implement research based programs that implement best practices to increase postsecondary and workforce preparation. Incorporation of activities that promote a college going culture at all 10 elementary ACE campuses and 3 feeder schools such as College Tours (Virtual), Career Awareness Visits, and Transition from Elementary to Middle School Seminars will ensure elementary students transitioning to Middle School have a clear vision of the career pathway and CTE programs of study they can select as they prepare for Middle School & High School. Students will learn about Industry Based Certifications they can earn upon entering high school as well as well as the careers they can pursue upon high school graduation (https://tea.texas.gov/academics/college-careerand-military-prep/career-and-technical-education). YOUTH DEVELOPMENT: Mentoring Program implementation (Source: The Role of School-based Group Mentoring in Promoting Resilience among Vulnerable Students 6/2019)

La Joya ISD will open 10 Texas ACE Center locations. Placing centers at campus locations will ensure centers are safe and easily accessible to students and parents. La Joya ISD will provide safe transportation to and from each center and home by following district transportation policies and providing qualified adult supervision. Budgetary needs were considered and addressed in the budget section of this application to ensure transportation needs are addressed and supplement and not supplant currently provided transportation services.

Regular Program Hours: Transportation for students only after school since the centers are housed at fully functional Elementary campuses.

Weekends and Summers: Weekends and Summer program transportation will be available for all participating students. Transportation will include pick-up and drop off of students at their homes.

Feeding-Locations: Students that report to centers from feeding sites will also be provided with transportation services to take them home after school.

Enrichment Travel: Centers may provide students with college trips, museums, and/or other educational related travel. Transportation will be provided for students on these event. Students will be picked up at designated center/location and returned to designated center/location and/or home.

Options: Parents that prefer to pick up their child(ren) will be required to provide a Participant's Parental Consent Form prior to joining activities. This form will be completed by all students when joining an ACE Center and will identify the method by which the student will travel to / leave the program each day. Parents (Guardians) will be required to provide information (name and relationship) of any individual that will be allowed to pick-up a student. Students leaving early from the program must signed out by an approved parent / guardian and provide proper identification to campus staff. District guidelines will be adhered to to ensure the safety of all participating students. Note: Students from feeder elementary schools will be walked to ACE Centers monitored by campus staff and an ACE Center staff member will receive the students and log their attendance to ensure safety.

La Joya ISD will create a comprehensive plan to disseminate information to the community regarding the ACE Texas Programs that includes 1) Video Broadcasting, 2)Social Media (FaceBook, Twitter, and District Website) and 3) Parent Connection 4) Diamond News (District Newspaper distributed to all students at La Joya ISD). 1) Video Broadcasting: La Joya ISD will broadcast to all La Joya ISD community (La Joya, Sullivan City, Peñitas, Palmview and Mission Texas) via TV Channel 17 information about the Texas Ace Centers. In collaboration with the La Joya ISD Public Information Department, a wide exposure campaign will be implemented to ensure all parents at participating campuses are informed of the centers and the services that can be accessed at each center. 2) Social Media: La Joya ISD has a very strong team of professionals in charge of the district's Social Media sector. In collaboration with the Public Information Department, La Joya ISD will ensure that information about the Texas ACE Centers is constantly advertised and provided to community members to ensure wide coverage and information dissemination. The information will be shared to all community via FaceBook, Twitter and District Website as well as each individual campus website where each Texas ACE Center will be located. 3)Parent Connection: La Joya ISD will utilize the Parent Connection system to send out district wide messages via phone and/or text to parents / community members informing them of the services provided at each location. The messaging service provides the ability to reach every parent for which the district has a phone number as well as the ability to send text messages with links embedded into the text message to access flyers and pamphlets with additional information about the Texas ACE centers. All information will be distributed in a manner that is understandable and culturally appropriate to our community. Information will go out in English and Spanish (written and/ printed) and will be accessible in the district website. Additionally, a La Joya ISD Texas ACE Website will be created with an individual page for each ACE campus to disseminate information and updates.

LJISD will coordinate with federal, state and local programs using existing resources such as TEXAS HOME LEARNING and with other appropriate community, state and federal resources to maximize the effectiveness of the program. In order to maximize program funding and provide additional services at each center, Year 1 & 2 Cycle 11 the existing Cycle 10, Texas ACE Program Director will manage and coordinate the Texas ACE Cycle 11 Program. This will save the program a full director salary. The Director will receive a stipend to compensate the additional work load to supervise the 10 centers in the amount of \$20,000 (\$2,000 per ACE Campus and required fringe benefits that the stipend generates - total of \$22,800). The Cycle 10 ACE Director has demonstrated extraordinary extraordinary ability to implement the ACE Program during dire circumstances, such as encountered during COVID lock down during which she successfully continued program implementation, STAAR intervention tutoring, and met measures & goals for student participation & parental community engagement. Utilizing this coordination strategy will save the program over \$95,000 in a two yr period that will be utilized to provide additional supplemental services at the ten Texas ACE Centers. Additionally, LJISD will wave \$65,474 in administrative cost to maximize program services that will go to afterschool activities and use existing resources not funded by grant: maintenance & other district programs to offer services. ACE Director will continue year 3-5 at budgeted salary scale from Cycle 11 funds. ACE staff will benefit from professional development opportunities provided by LJISD thought the school year in a collaborative effort to better serve participating students and their families. Existing LJISD facilities and equipment will be utilized to train teachers and partners. Texas ACE Programs will be able to utilize existing technology equipment purchased through federal and state funds to provide services to parents and students. Through intensive PD and Title I and state compensatory funds the sustainability of this program beyond grant period will be addressed. All activities will supplement and not supplant or duplicate services currently provided.

Preliminary Plan for Community Learning Centers Continuation after funding: La Joya ISD is fully committed to the success and sustainability efforts of the Texas ACE program. Written letters of support signed by La Joya ISD School Board are attached with this application. Best practices, equipment and materials provided and acquired throughout the grant will be utilized to continue activities after the grant ends. PARTNERSHIPS: La Joya ISD will develop and identify agencies within the community and form partnerships that can provide on-going support and access to resources at little or no cost such as: \* Hidalgo County Law Enforcement which can offer guest speakers \* Colleges & Universities to acquire mentors and tutors from Teacher Preparation Programs \* Local Workforce Development & Dept. of Health and Human Services which can provide presentations on services \*TX Dept. of Agriculture which can provide students with free meals beyond school hours. SUPPLIES&MATERIALS: La Joya ISD will use grant funds to purchase long term equipment and materials that can be utilized to provide fun activities after the funding period such as: \* Durable sports equipment. Durable equipment will be available for usage after funding has ended \*Gardening Supplies for gardening projects and school gardens. These supplies will be used after funding ends. LOCAL FUNDS: La Joya ISD will attempt to utilize local, state and/or federal funds to provide staff to oversee the program and offer tutoring and homework assistance as well as other enrichment activities depending on funds available. La Joya ISD is confident on its capacity to continue operations of ACE centers program activities after funding support ends.

Budget Note:Budget allocations are reasonable and necessary. Proposed budget addressed salaries, supplies & trainings as well as sufficient resources to all ACE Centers for implementation of a high quality after school program. Additionally, \$65,474 of Administrative Costs were waved & allocated for additional student services every year (x5).

La Joya ISD will encourage and use appropriately qualified persons to serve as volunteers during the implementation of the Texas ACE Program Cycle 11. La Joya ISD plans to partner with South Texas College and The University of Texas RGV to solicit volunteers from their Teacher/ Education Preparation Programs. This will provide a more cost-effective program and will aid in sustainability of the program beyond its funding sycle. The Program Director will meet with the appropriate staff from South Texas College and UTRGV to present the program and activities that will be offered during the program. Volunteers will be able to serve as:

- \* Mentors for at risk students
- \* Provide Homework Assistance (in person and/or virtual)
- \* Supervise enrichment activities
- \* Provide one-on-one tutoring (in person and/or virtual)

Policy for Screening and Placing Volunteers: La Joya ISD will adhere to all Texas statutes as well as District requirements for all volunteers who participate in the program. Participating individuals will be fingerprinted and undergo a criminal background check to ensure the safety of all participants served in the program. Once approved to volunteer, a training plan will be provided by the Project Director and/or the Site Coordinator). This will prepare the volunteer with the necessary skills to safely care and provide services for the students.

Additional locations will be reviewed and targeted to recruit volunteers once volunteers from STC and UTRGV have been acquired and placed. Such locations include but are not limited to: Rotary Clubs, PTA organizations, Parents and more.

Recruiting volunteers from Colleges and Universities is intended to provide students with high quality services and at the same time help future educators acquire the experience to serve students in a real education setting.

Offering a high quality program will increase the response and participation and parents will be assured their child is in a safe place attending a high quality after school Texas ACE Program.

La Joya ISD will implement a strong, targeted recruitment process to ensure student enrollment and retention in the program over time. This process will include recruitment strategies/activities, and enrolled students attendance checks to ensure program success. RECRUITMENT: Recruitment of students will start July 1, 2021 (after ACE Coordinators hired). ACE Director will widely promote the ACE Center, its mission and goals to students, parents and community through district's social media, district website, school website and district's TV Channel 17 and Parent Link phone message system. Additionally, ACE Coordinators will analyze campus data and recruit students for the program from students that have academic needs in reading, math, science or other subjects. Recruitment Outreach efforts will start August 2021 and continue (ongoing) until program meets campus performance goals of students to be serviced. (Fall 2021/Spring 2022) ATTENDANCE /STUDENT OUTCOMES: La Joya ISD will supplement school day academic interventions. The ACE Coordinators will work with campus leadership to analyze student data from previous year, design a focused student recruitment strategy and in collaboration with campus leadership and ACE Director recruit after-school teachers/tutors to implement the program. ACE Coordinators that have feeder schools will be in charge of meeting with campus leadership from feeder elementary school to ensure the same student data analysis process is followed for recruitment of students. This activity will take place starting July 1, 2021 once ACE Coordinators have been hired and placed at the corresponding campuses. (Fall2021/Spring 2022). STUDENT RETENTION: Student retention will be maintained through the implementation of high interest after-school program activities: Tutoring, Homework Assistance, Book Clubs, Science Clubs, Coding Robotics, Math & Science Clubs, Sports Clubs, Gymnastics, Dancing, Music & Theatre as well as CTE Computer Wizard Lab, Arts, Cooking, Cosmetology, Drone Aviation and other activities (Fall & Spring).

La Joya ISD conducted a robust needs assessment process which was reviewed and analyzed to ensure correlation with the center operation schedule and corresponding staffing and budget plans. The needs assessment identified academic needs and gaps of each campus, identified academic gaps, obtained campus leadership feedback regarding 21st CCLC program and analyzed community resources. In order to ensure the measures of effectiveness and student service targets while maintaining center-level quality, the following took place: 1) Campus Leadership provided Letter of Commitment to participate on the 21st CCLC Cycle 11 program. 2) District School Board provided Letter of Support of the 21st CCLC Cycle 11 Program 3) Participating Campuses needs were reviewed to ensure appropriate number of students to be served were selected/targeted. 4) Program Partnerships created with organizations that will continue to provide services beyond program funding years. 5) Staffing & Program Budget were created and allocated based on campus needs, and steps were taken to ensure budget was maximized towards student services. Staffing involved creating job descriptions and salary schedules for ACE Director, ACE Site Coordinators, Family Engagement Specialist and ACE Secretary. (See attached) High level of expectations placed on ACE Staff as evident on job descriptions. 6) Carefully created program plan intends to serve a total of 1,690 students (30% eligible students at each of the 10 participating campuses and 15% eligible students from the 3 selected feeder schools). LJISD Leadership Team (Elementary Executive Directors) will implement a monitoring process to ensure program goals and performance targets are being reached at each participating ACE Campus. This process will ensure center level quality is maintained and the appropriate number of students and parents are serviced at each participating ACE Center. Additionally, as part of the measures of effectiveness observations will be conducted on online/virtual after-school activities due to COVID19. Budget for staffing allocations as follows: ACE Director(1) Education-Masters Required Salary \$70,750, ACE Site Coordinators (10) Education Bachelors 5+ yrs Teaching Experience Salary \$57,250, ACE FES (1) Education Masters in Counseling Psychology 3+ yrs Teaching Experience Salary \$58,000 Secretary(1) \$29,000. All Certifications must be in Core Content Subject Area.


